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## Coming Soon: Main Street App and Maps

Easton isn't exactly an enormous town, but there are plenty of shops and restaurants tucked down side streets and alleys. Main Street's marketing committee is undertaking two initiatives to make it easier for both visitors and residents to find what they need downtown.

For the ever-growing number of smartphone users out there, a Main Street mobile app is being developed and nearing completion. It will include all the information visitors and residents need to get the most from downtown, including a directory of restaurants, parking areas and local services such as salons. The app will be ready to download from the Main Street website and your phone's app store by early February.

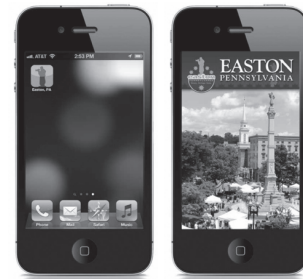
In the late spring of 2013, keep an eye out for new directional signage around town. Inspired by the success of the maps and signs for the Karl Stirner Arts Trail, these pedestal maps will point pedestrians to local attractions, restaurants and other downtown businesses. Main Street will be able to update the maps as more business are added to the downtown core.

With the city's cooperation, the Main Street Marketing Committee will install at four signs. Ideas for locations include near the Grand Eastonian Suites Hotel, near the parking deck at Pine Street and S. Third, on N. Third Street near Spring Garden St. and near the Sigal Museum /Visitors Center.

## Design Committee Hopes to Shine a Light on Alleys

Downtown Easton's Bank Street and Lehn's Court alleys already have a lot going for them — shops, restaurants and plenty of foot traffic. This summer, the Main Street Design Committee hopes to shine a light on these unique thoroughways and the businesses located along them. Committee members Amy Boccadoro and Mike Brett are spearheading a project of lighting and art installations for these two alleys.

The Downtown Alley Lighting Project has two components: a permanent lighting system and a temporary art installation. The lighting will make the alleys more visible, providing increased safety for tenants of nearby buildings, evening patrons of bars and restaurants, and late-night staff of downtown businesses.

Amy and Mike imagine cafe-style strands of bare bulbs criss-crossing the alleys. This portion of the project

will be installed with the support of the City and Main Street. However, they will also be seeking input from businesses on and near Lehn's Court and the pedestrian-only sections of Bank Street.

The proposed art installation was first inspired by a trip to the Simon Silk Mill on 13th Street. This complex is the site of Movies at the Mill and is being rebuilt as an arts and residential community. In the mill's past life, it was used to manufacture lampshades.

"They still have all the old forms for the lampshades, in varying sizes. We wanted to do something with them because there are a ton of them," explains Amy.

Drawing on a Norwegian design and the materials available at the Silk Mill, Amy and Mike have proposed an installation that makes use of the skeletal lampshade frames. The frames would be hung on the bare bulbs, and possibly given a coat of paint for a pop of bright colors. The overall effect would create a sort of outdoor ceiling, while connecting Easton's arts and industrial heritage.

"It's great we can bring that part of the Silk Mill into downtown," says Amy.

This project is still in the early planning and design phases, but expect to hear more about it before summer. The Main Street Design Committee will be working closely with the City and business and property owners in further planning and execution.

## Economic Restructuring Committee Participates in City's Comprehensive Plan Rewrite Process

ESMI's Economic Restructuring Committee has been involved in the process of rewriting the City's Comprehensive Plan which began in June of 2012. A Comprehensive Plan sets the development direction for the City for 20 years and is the most important regulatory guiding document that a municipal entity can write. Items reviewed range from infrastructure and utilities to housing and business and the relationship of all of these elements

to the greater whole, our neighbors and the region. The document essentially becomes a law which decisions by local government and the Planning Commission and Zoning Hearing Board are made. The Comprehensive Plan is supported by the technical details outlined in planning and zoning codes but does not replace these laws or amend them. Becky Bradley, Director of Planning and Codes for the City states, "We will be codifying how we plan to develop and where that development will be, how it will relate to the neighborhood that it is part of, adjoining neighborhoods and the City and region as a whole. Utilizing statistical and economic modeling, mapping and urban design drawings we will bring the ideas that we get from the community together in a single guiding document. Interviews with organizations like Main Street, utility companies, state and regional agencies, etc. will be held through March 2013.

We will be conducting targeted door-to-door surveys in the spring and anticipate having a larger public meeting on our findings after that. Analysis, synthesis, writing, mapping and drawing begins with a final document being released in 2014."

Input from the Easton Main Street volunteers and leadership is very valuable to the City staff as they work on updating Easton's Comp Plan. Because of the important work we do in revitalizing the downtown and working closely with business and property owners, we have important insight into how our community should continue to develop. The ER Committee looks forward to continuing to provide guidance and feedback about downtown development as the process continues in 2013 and 2014. Watch for further public announcements about how the general public can participate in the process of rewriting the City's Comprehensive Plan.
